#### 3. SYLLABUS

A much-debated topic in current linguistic theory is the architecture of the human grammar and the relationship between the grammatical components (or modules). Morphology can be described as the component of the human grammar which is responsible for the production and perception of words, and as the subdiscipline of linguistics which deals with word formation. The relationship between morphology and other components of the grammar is still an open question. The answer to this question is closely related to the view that we take on the architecture of the grammar and to the grammatical model that we adopt. This course will delve into some theoretical notions of morphological analysis, such as: allomorphy, productivity/competition/constraints and the notion of the morpheme, while at the same time we will explore the relationship between form and meaning in morphological structures, the notion of head and the different types of inflection (inherent vs contextual inflection). We will also discuss broader topics such as morphological acquisition, the structure of the mental lexicon and the integration of borrowings.

# We will consider topics like the following:

- Morphological analysis and grammatical models
- Morphological processes (derivation, compounding, conversion)
- The relationship between form and meaning in morphological structures
- Mental lexicon and the Architecture of Grammar
- Morphological features and lexicalist theory
- Morphological categories (agent nouns, verbalizers, negation)
- Morphological variation (intralinguistic and extralinguistic)
- Integration of borrowings
